

Doncaster wins in smashing style

ONCASTER State League One men's hockey side opened its season in smashing style with a 7-0 victory against Hawthorn-TEMC.

Led by its new captain, Olympian Lachlan Elmer, Doncaster scored three goals in the first 10 minutes to set up its victory.

Hawthorn-TEMC Olympian goalkeeper Lachlan Dreher was the only reason Doncaster did not reach double figures.

The match opened at a furious pace and inside two minutes teenage winger Stuart Campbell

scored with a blistering shot from close range.

His goal was followed three minutes later when Cameron Muir deflected a cross from the right into the net.

Doncaster was rampant and none personified this more than Elmer, who celebrated his return from the AIS in Perth with a majestic display in midfield.

Carrying a 4-0 lead into the second half Doncaster slowed just a fraction in the heat.

Hawthorn-TEMC tightened

this did not show on the scoreboard.

After 15 minutes, Lachlan Elmer put Doncaster 5-0 up with a superb deflection after some fine work by Andrew Hodder at centre half.

James Elmer, back after a knee reconstruction, made the score 6-0 when he combined with his brother to score from the finest of angles.

With less than two minutes to go, Doncaster made it a lucky 7-0 when Matthew Woolsey rammed home a penalty corner.

Doncaster continued to attack for the remainder of the game but a lack of scoring power prevented it from furthering its cause.

Tireless inside right Fiona Harvey and mother-of-two and Doncaster legend Helen Padget at inside left, along with fullback Andrea Snow were dominant throughout.





Costly 6-2 victory

ONCASTER overpowered Essendon to cruise to a 6-2 victory in round two of the State Hockey League.

The victory came at some cost though, with skipper Lachlan Elmer sustaining a serious leg injury which will likely keep him out for six weeks.

Doncaster began slowly but soon settled into rhythm when a penalty corner was converted with a crashing shot by power hitter Dean Todero.

Within a minute, it was 2-0 when inside right, Tim Reid, broke away and scored from the top of the circle.

The period which followed can only be described as an onslaught.


DONCASTER cemented its position on top of the State Hockey League on Saturday with a record 12-3 victory over 1991 premier Waverley.



It was a club record and sweet revenge for an 8-2 drubbing Waverley handed out to Doncaster in last year's preliminary final.

The win leaves Doncaster undefeated on top of the ladder and it was its fourth successive win over the team second on the ladder.

Doncaster opened the scoring in the first three minutes from a penalty corner set play when Lachlan Elmer found Jeremy Hiskins for a goal, Fourminutes later Elmer made it 2-0 from a penalty corner rebound, before Waverley pulled one back with a deflection from close range.

It was 3-1 when a string of passes from James Elmer to Tim Reid ended on Elmer's stick for a high flick into the goal.

Not long after it was 4-1 when Hiskins took on a defender and with superb ball skills netted from a fine angle.

Waverley scored its second soon after but Doncaster pulled out to a 5-2 lead when Elmer found David Shaw in the circle. He made no mistake with a beautifully constructed flip over the diving keeper.

Although Waverley grabbed a quick goal early in the second half, Don-caster remained firmly in control, with Hiskins adding his third before Matthew Woosely made it 8-2 with a penalty corner conversion.

James Elmer crashed in goal number nine at the 20-minute mark before posting another three unanswered goals that crushed any spirit Waverley may have had left.

Although the tempo slowed in the second half. Doncaster was still in command against the outclassed MCC combination.


Hiskins brought up his hat trick of goals after receiving a David Shaw cross.

Doncaster hockey wizard aiming for Olympic team

OR Doncaster's Jeremy Hiskins, the sky is the limit.

Hiskins is the leading goalscorer in the competition with 18 goals from 10 matches in his second season of State League One hockey.

This includes a remarkable total of six of Doncaster's 10 goals against MCC a fortnight ago.

Scoring goals is nothing new to Hiskins, who has carried his brilliant junior goal-scoring capabilities into senior ranks in a fashion that has left opponents bemused.

Hiskins became interested in hockey when he spent five years in Ger-

"Over there, tennis and hockey clubs are joined. In winter I would play tennis while in summer it would be hockey. I really liked hockey and when I came back to Australia I continued to play it."

The 17-year-old has become a permanent fixture of Victorian junior teams in recent years.

Hiskins was an important member of the successful Victorian under 15 team in 1990 and played a major part in Victoria winning the under 17 national championships last year.

Earlier this year Hiskins produced nine goals from nine games in the national championships in Darwin, with the highlight being his two goals in Victoria's 4-2 win against the Northern Territory in the final.

Hiskins, with teammate Jason Manos, was involved in the VIS's losing campaign against Korea in 1993 and is a member of the Australian junior training squad.

So when does Hiskins, who trains four nights a week, find time to complete his second year of the VCE?

"I do a bit of work here and there," said Hiskins, who juggles his spare time around hockey.

Along with the talented Manos and Stuart Campbell, Hiskins is a product of Doncaster's youth program.

Hiskins attributes his good form to the influence of Doncaster coach George Manos.

"He has given me a lot of confidence and encouragement and has got my head up when I was down in form."

Manos speaks highly of Hiskins: "Jeremy has a very good temperament in big games. Regardless of whether he is scoring goals, Jeremy helps create a lot of goals," Manos said.

"Jeremy is not an individual player."

Hiskins also appreciates the chance to play under VIS coach, Jim Irvine, who played 170 games as a defender for Australia.

Spending time at the VIS with Australian representatives Jay Stacy and Lachlan Elmer has also helped Hiskins improve mentally as a player.

The level-headed Hiskins has his eyes set on the greatest prize available to a hockey player, a gold medal at the Olympics.

"It'll take a lot of hard work but I am prepared to put in. It just depends on what the future holds," he said.

"Maybe we don't have their measure yet," said Doncaster coach, George Manos.


"We should have been in front at half-time but we didn't capitalise on our chances."
